Did you know that the Sem is the oldest standing building in the Acadia campus? For many Acadia students and Alumni, the Seminary holds memories memories which only one who has lived there can have. It has a history which dates back to the early days of the university; a history of which not many people are aware; one which in these past few years has faded into the back-

The old Acadia Ladies Seminary as it was built in 1878 gave instruction to girls about mne o'clock. below the degree level in several fields. A course in music was offered and included instruction in vocal and instrumental. A course in Art was given with Each night two girls were appointed to studios on the top floor of the Seminary. A general two year Collegiate course including such subjects as English, French, Latin, German, Physics and Mathematics was given which was the equivalent of the Sophomore year at University. Bible was a compulsory subject for all girls. No degrees were given but the graduates could go on to instiattended the Seminary were constantly of blowing fuses. reminded that they were not part of the College.

Shortly after the Sem was built, the west wing was taken over as a college girls residence, and the girls attending Seminary lived in the present college portion. The Horton reception room was the site of the Seminary Library. The room new used as the Horton Chapel was the Dining room and the Gym quarters were in the Home Economics rooms.

Gym classes were held at night from nine to nine-thirty and included as one arrival the bey presented a calling can alumnus of the Seminary said "everything to help our form". Girls were taught how to ride bicycles, and practised in the gym. The main gymnastic exercises were done with dumb bells and Inclan clubs. Vaulting was also a orite sport. The gym suits were navy serge bloomers and tunics, and light blue blouses with sailor-like collars. The uniforms came just below the knees.

The morning rising bell was at 6:30 a. m. and breakfast was served at 8. Between 6:30 and 8, the girls were allowed to go out for bicycle rides if they could get a teacher to accompany them. With the exception of Sunday night upper all meals were compulsory. Inpection was held every day immediateThe evening mail was delivered at

Electricity was not installed until 1900, and prior to that there were two oil lamps per room. Lamp were filled in the lamp room, which has become an ironing room for present Semites. > Church attendance was compulsory every Sunday morning, and recommend ed in the evening. Girls were paradec to church two by two, with teachers at the first and at the end. Special seats in the gallery were alloted to the young ladies of the Seminary.

Permission had to be granted for girls to go down town. Two girls had to go together, and they were only allowed to go into one store. The lady who looked after the telephone office also sold ice cream and chocolates, and girls were permitted to buy there.

The college sponsored the Star Course of Lectures, which was forerunner to after breakfast. Study hours were our Fine Arts programmes. Various prorom 7 to 9, every night. Gym classes grammes were given including biographs were held every night from 9 to 9:30. which were the first movies. Lectures

I singers often accompanied the films.

No dances were allowed, but rather receptions where the gentlemen asked the lady to have a topic with him, whereupon a current world situation was diseussed. Long dresses were worn on all occasions. Dresses with very high necks and long sleeves had to be worn to receptions. Muslin was the accepted fabric; silks and satins were not permitted.

Naughty girls were punished by being put on limits, which meant they couldn't leave the campus except for church, and all priveleges were taken away. It's strange how some traditions have stuck.

## SEM: Acadia's White House Declared a National Heritage Site

EMINARY HOUSE, long a symbol of Acadia's spirit and endurance, has now been recognized as a Canadian landmark as well. Canadian heritage minister Sheila Copps made it official in July, bestowing on the venerable residence a national heritage designation. Constructed in 1879, "Sem" is the oldest building on the Acadia campus and is believed to be the oldest university building still in use in Nova Scotia. Despite various upgrades and additions, Acadia's 'White House' still reflects the gracious charm and simplicity of the late 19th century.

Ironically, in 1997 Seminary led Acadia's countdown to the millennium, becoming the most technologically advanced building on campus, thanks to the Acadia Advantage initiative. While still housing students and classes, Sem now assumes double duty as the home of Acadia's School of Education. The resi-


dence which only a decade earlier was hard pressed to produce a working fire extinguisher, is once again back on the cutting edge.

The impressive four-storey Victorian structure began life as the Acadia Ladies Seminary, a fashionable Baptist academy until 1926 when its residents became a part of Horton Academy, up to that point an entirely male preserve. Although known primarily to a generation of Acadia alumni as a women's residence, Sem has served many functions over its lifetime. Since its construction, and despite numerous internal and external threats to its existence, it is a more enduring part of the Acadia campus than even University Hall, which has twice been destroyed by fire. Andy Mitchell, chairman of the Historic Sites and Monuments Board which recommended the heritage designation, says that Seminary House "provides a particularly telling example of the nature and

setting of the earliest phase of higher education of women."

Designed by Halifax architect Andrew Dewar, Seminary House was constructed by the Rhodes & Curry Company of Amherst. Another wing was added in 1892 and a music department known as "The Barn" was completed in 1899. The Barn included a pipeorgan, five grand pianos, twenty practice rooms also equipped with pianos, a room devoted to choral practice, and a classroom complete with a Carnegie College Music Set (900 records; 250 complete scores; 100 music books, and a Capehart Automatic Gramophone). The Barn was summarily destroyed in 1970 and its contents lost.

Occupying the east flank of Acadia's quad, Seminary House has spacious rooms illuminated by tall arched windows, affording an impressive view of the campus and the Valley beyond. It originally featured a centre cupo-

la, while a tower graced the new wing. These adornments fell victim to the "modernizations" of 1935. The modern marvel of architecture was designed with 'ladies' in mind, convenience being the overriding goal. The basement contained a kitchen, dining room, laundry, drying room, pantry, china room, store rooms, and servants' rooms. The ground floor contained six parlors and eight bedrooms, while the second and third floors each included seven parlors and another eight bedrooms.

Articles from the December 1878 and October 1879 issues of The Acadia Athenaeum enthused about the hot water heating and four bathrooms boasting "hot and cold water," spacious halls and "cheerful and cozy parlors". The structure was seen as a suitable place for "...young ladies of the Baptist denomination especially and of all denominations in general" to pursue their studies. "To the rear, and attached to the main building is a smaller structure containing classrooms and play rooms for the young ladies, so that they will not have to go out of doors at all in order to attend most of their classes. And when they do have to go to the academy to attend class, the distance is so short as to cause no inconvenience. With the present efficient staff of teachers and the fine accommodations, our seminary offers rare

inducements to young ladies of the lower provinces wishing a liberal education..."

Speaking on behalf of the Historic Sites and Monuments Board, Andy Mitchell sug-

gests that "The institutional history of the Seminary reflects the changing position of women within Canadian universities, while its location, external appearance and internal plan and functions all speak to the way in which 19th century society viewed the higher education of women."


In addition to the spirit documented in the companion story on Phyllis and Don MacPherson (page 5), the term Sem 'spirit' conjures up less comforting images as well. Like every respectable Victorian edifice, Seminary reportedly has its very own

ghost. The origins of this apparition are lost in the shrouds of time but several eye-witness reports exist, invariably describing the white, translucent figure of a lady gliding imperiously about her domain or palely loitering on back stairways.

William Porquet, writing in the March 16, 1989 issue of the Athenaeum argues that, "Even when one filters out happenings explainable by antique plumbing, creaky wooden stairs, low rumbles of the old building settling into the mud, and spirits of an alcoholic sort, one is still left with a disturbing collection of what could be supernatural phenomena." Porquet, who did his own anecdotal research on the subject, wisely concludes that, "It's probably best if the folklore remains as ethereal as the ghost itself."

Apparitions, aspirations, and possibly the occasional assignation. That's what Seminary House was, and continues to be, all about. It is entirely fitting that this special place now belongs to all Canadians.

## INSIDE MAY 1975 MACLEAN'S

When John Macfarlane returned to Maclean's as executive editor earlier this year. one of the newer staffers began speculating on his age and eventually guessed early



forties. Macfarlane was not amused. He's a callow 33. It was an understandable mistake. It's hard to believe that, in this business especially, anyone could do in a mere decade what Macfarlane has done.

As with most people in the trade, he entered it by accident: an angry letter to his university newspaper was so good he was offered a job. Eventually he became its editor, then president of Canadian University Press, through which he met Dic Doyle, editor of the Globe and Mail. Doyle became his employer and his inspiration - "He instilled in me a kind of idealism about the integrity and dignity of the profession." At the Globe Macfarlane wrote editorials, then became entertainment editor. He switched to the Star, where he was also entertainment editor, and then to Maclean's as associate editor. He got his own magazine, Toronto Life, which he edited for 18 months. For another 18 months he was president of Analytical Communications Inc., a major public relations company, where he learned some important truths about himself, not the least of which was that he belonged in journalism.

Though Macfarlane can write and write well, he concentrated from the beginning on being an editor. "I was always an overachiever," he explains his decision. "Very ambitious. I guess I saw the route to the top was traveled more quickly through editing than writing." That's the cynical side, but there is another: "I love editing. To me it's a kind of a birth process, giving birth every time. I've never lost the habit of picking up a thing when it's done and going over and over and over it. I get such a thrill out of the existence of the finished product."

But this is a lasting and substantive thrill, not to be confused with those he experiences in his secret life as a jock, scoring goals in a shinny league or hitting softballs in the Toronto Men's Press League. Last summer he hit his first-ever home run off the Star's Marty Goodman. "Can any thing," he gasped, "be better than this?"

• July 11-14, 1960 – I was working at Lake Louise and went to Calgary to see the air show. I went to see Bill at the hotel where the Hawks were staying and met his roommate, Jim; Bill was being interviewed by a very gay reporter and Jim was silently shaking with laughter behind Polly Adler's book "A House is not a Home" --- Funny. But our eyes met and we laughed together ©

- Cannot seem to find where Bill & Jim came down on Dec 17, 1960.
- Dec 29 Bill and Jim down for New Years eve which we spent babysitting the sleeping Miller kids. Had steak and salad and a quiet evening, separately from Bill & Annabelle, until Kath & George came home.
- The log book says Jim and Bill flew down on Dec 29 and returned the same day; in truth, they did not return to Chatham until 1:15 Jan 2, 1961.

- Jim and Bill came to Lake Louise on July 9th from Calgary in a lovely white convertible. Bill and Annabelle went to a jazz concert at Lakeside and as Jim and I sat in the car, watching the moon rise about the glacier above the shimmering lake, we decided that we wanted to marry when his GH tour was completed. I believe it was me who said, "Yes, I will marry you" but he hadn't asked.
- Jim and Bill came up another time and stayed in a small cabin outside the LL gates; Jim and I went for a drive to Moraine Lake. That is the night he gave me my engagement ring; I LOVED IT and I still do, 56 years later.
- When Annabelle and I arrived in New Brunswick for her and Bill to be married on Sep 28, Jim came up to Dalhousie on the 26th; we drove around and then parked at Camp Chaleur. Who'd have thought it, huh? The camp where I learned to swim and make clay ashtrays and love bonfires.....
